★ **Subscriptions and Changes of Address:** Send to Headley Brothers Ltd., The Invicta Press, Ashford, Kent, England. All subscriptions will begin with the last January issue.

★ **Free Distribution:** In principle free copies of the journal go only to individuals engaged in Bible translation work. In addition Bible schools and theological colleges located on the mission fields are entitled to free copies. All others are invited to subscribe. See inside front cover.

★ **Review of Mailing List:** Every three years a complete review will be made of all non-paying subscribers. This will be done by the Translations Consultants at the United Bible Societies Triennial Workshop.
